Games & Activities

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Games are learner-centered activities and they can be considered as an excellent opportunity for students in terms of taking responsibility for their own learning. Being one of the most essential components in foreign language classes, thanks to the advantages, games are frequently used in learning and teaching English as well.

It is a well-known fact that games are educationally valuable, and they can be highly motivating and challenging. Providing a meaningful context for language use, they encourage students to interact, communicate and sustain the effort of learning (Lee, 1995). Games allow students to analyze the information and develop their critical thinking skills (Lujan et al., 2006), and they also develop problem-solving skills through choices students make during a game (Feinstein et al., 2002). Furthermore, it is known that games can lower anxiety and contribute to second language acquisition. Enabling students to acquire new experiences within a foreign language and adding diversion to the regular classroom activities, they create a relaxed learning atmosphere (Fromme, 2003; McFarlane and Sakellariou, 2002).

Supporting the teaching methods used frequently in the classroom, the games and activities included in the book are quite useful for not only teachers but also students. The book offers teachers to have the opportunity to learn about various types of games and activities that can enhance learning process while adding fun to class. Besides, it is a great book for students to take responsibility for their own learning thanks to the games and activities that let them work individually, in pairs, in groups and as a whole class.

With this book, it is aimed to make learning more effective and meaningful by providing a competitive, participatory and enjoyable educational environment. Another aim of this book is to help students develop self-confidence and build higher self-esteem. Moreover, thanks to the interactive games and activities, it is intended that students use the four basic language skills integrated with each other more effectively.

FUNCTIONS F1 Talking about wishes and regrets F2 Apologizing F3 Giving explanations



Don't Ruin My Wish!









This activity enables students to talk about wishes. It helps develop students' ability to speak fluently and interactively. It also helps them to build confidence and boost their creative thinking. It is a great activity to make logical connections between ideas.

Materials and Preparation

Bring a blank piece of paper for each student.

Procedure

- Give each student a blank piece of paper. 1
- 2 Have them make a list of three wishes. Get them to imagine that they've found a genie's lamp if you want to add some more fun to the activity.
- 3 Get them to write down their wishes.

E.g.

- I wish I had a twin sister.
- I wish I could sail around the world.
- I wish I were the captain of the school basketball team.
- Tell your students that they should be careful about what they wish for. Sometimes, when we get something we want, there may be hidden consequences that can make it bad, e.g., "If you were the captain of the school basketball team, you would feel exhausted acting as a second coach."
- 5 Tell them they are going to play a game and they are going to imagine the negative consequences of their classmates' wishes. As an example, ask a student for one of his/her wishes and get his/her partner to ruin the wish.

E.g.

Dennis: I wish I were a superhero.

Lara: If you were a superhero, you would have a highly dangerous and stressful life.

- Elicit more potentially negative consequences of being a superhero, e.g., "You would have lots of enemies." "You 6 would feel very uncomfortable in your superhero clothes."
- 7 Tell your students that they are going to do the same thing in their groups. Put your students in groups of three. Have one student read his/her wish and let the others ruin it.
- The student who says the most reasonable disadvantage of the wish gets a point. The student with the most points is the winner of the group.
- 9 You can put all the winners in a group and get them to play the game one more time to choose the winner of the class.
- 10 You can also have students choose the funniest and the most creative disadvantage of the wish given.



FUNCTIONS F1 Talking about wishes and regrets F2 Apologizing F3 Giving explanations











This activity enables students to give explanations. It will also help them improve their listening and speaking skills.

Materials and Preparation

Make enough copies of the worksheet on page 206 for each pair. Make sure they cut up the cards and put them face

Procedure

- 1 Have students work in pairs.
- 2 One of the students in each pair picks up a card and plans what to say as an explanation, an excuse or a reasonable clarification.
- 3 On being ready, s/he starts talking. Then, they change roles. Make sure each student has talked three times at least.
- 4 Then pick five cards randomly and ask for the explanations they have given to their partners. Have them share the cards with everyone. Nominate volunteers.
- In another version, pairs can create dialogues related to the situation and act them out in the classroom. 5

Why Did You Write ...?





With this pair work activity, students will be able to talk about wishes and regrets. They will also be able to improve their four main language skills.

Materials and Preparation

Make enough copies of the worksheets on pages 207-208 for each pair of students.

Procedure

- 1 Put students into pairs and give them the corresponding worksheet (Student A and Student B).
- 2 First, get them to read the instructions about wishes and regrets and then write their answers in a few words in the corresponding shapes.
- 3 Then, have them fold the paper and swap it with their partners.
- 4 Get students to take turns with their partners asking and answering questions about the information written in the shapes. Encourage them to ask for more details.

E.g.

Maya: Why did you write, "Take better care of myself?"

Deniz: Because I wish I'd taken better care of myself in recent years.

Maya: Why didn't you?

Deniz: ...

5 When the activity is over, get some feedback from the class.



FUNCTIONS F1 Talking about wishes and regrets F2 Apologizing F3 Giving explanations



Please Accept My Apologies









With this pair work activity, students will be able to role-play different situations in which they are required to give explanations and offer an apology. They will also be able to improve their four main language skills.

Materials and Preparation

Copy and cut out the worksheet on page 209.

Procedure

- 1 Put students into pairs and give each pair a role card that describes a situation requiring an apology.
- 2 Have students imagine a scenario based on the situation on the role card and write a dialog. Set a time limit, e.g., 10 minutes.
- 3 When the time is over, get pairs to role-play their dialogs in front of the class.
- 4 After watching all the role-plays, ask the class to vote for the best performance and the best apology.









With this pair work activity, students will be able to give explanations for different situations. They will also be able to improve their listening, speaking and reading skills.

Materials and Preparation

Copy and cut out the worksheet on page 210 for each pair of students.

- 1 Put students into pairs.
- 2 Give each pair three sets of role-play cards (Student A and Student B).
- 3 Get them to have conversations by following the prompts on the cards.
- 4 Encourage students to follow up on their partners' answers with further questions.
- 5 When the task has been completed, ask a few pairs to role-play their conversations in front of the class.



FUNCTIONS F1 Talking about wishes and regrets F2 Apologizing F3 Giving explanations









This activity enables students to apologize properly for the given situations. It also enables students to improve their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills.

Materials and Preparation

Get enough copies of the worksheet on page 211 for each group.

Procedure

- 1 Divide the students into groups of three or four.
- 2 Give each group a copy.
- 3 Have students examine the situations and come up with their own ideas for the apologies for each one.
- 4 Remind students to use different sentence forms for each situation. They can write their sentences in the space left next to each situation.
- 5 When they finish, let groups swap their worksheets. Ask them to check the responses.
- 6 The group that has the most correct responses becomes the winner.
- 7 As an extension, you can randomly read a sentence from the sample answer key and expect students to tell the number of the situation as quickly as possible.

Make It Clear







This activity enables students to give explanations of the given quotes. It allows the class to expand the ideas of the group, which often leads to more in-depth conversations. The activity also encourages students to improve their listening and speaking skills.

Materials and Preparation

No special preparation is needed.

- Divide the students into groups of four or five.
- Write the given quotes on the board. (If you want, you can change them.)
 - Better good manners than good looks.
 - Good manners don't cost anything.
 - Good manners and kindness are always in fashion.
 - The hardest job children face today is learning good manners without seeing more.
- 3 Tell the groups to choose one of the given quotes and analyze it as a group.
- 4 Ask them to explain their ideas by giving reasons and examples. Remind them to support their ideas well.
- 5 When the groups are ready, ask them to present their explanations.
- 6 The group that gets the most applause becomes the winner.





FUNCTIONS F1 Talking about wishes and regrets F2 Apologizing F3 Giving explanations











This activity enables students to talk about their wishes and regrets. It also encourages students to improve their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills.

Materials and Preparation

Copy and cut up the set of cards on pages 212-213.

Procedure

- 1 Divide the classroom into four groups.
- 2 Deliver a set of cards to each group.
- 3 Students read the situation written on their set and brainstorm the ways to complete the sentences in the chart.
- 4 Then they read their ideas aloud, and the other members of the groups had to guess what their given scenario was.
- 5 Discuss the outcomes with the whole class.









This activity enables students to apologize in different situations. It also encourages students to improve their listening and speaking skills.

Materials and Preparation

Cut the cards on page 214 into two columns, with situations cards in italics and useful language cards in quotation marks.

- 1 Divide the class into pairs.
- 2 Deliver the situation cards to each pair.
- 3 Pairs examine the situations and come up with their own ideas for an apology for each one.
- 4 The language cards are then given to them to match with the situations.
- 5 At the end of the game, give each pair an uncut version to check their answers.
- 6 The pair with the most precise answers wins the game.



FUNCTIONS F1 Talking about wishes and regrets F2 Apologizing F3 Giving explanations











This activity enables students to give explanations for certain situations. It also encourages students to improve their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills.

Materials and Preparation

Copy and cut out the given situations on page 215 into strips and fold each strip before putting them in a bag.

Procedure

- Have each student come and pick a piece of paper from the bag.
- 2 On a piece of paper, students write an apology and explanation note to the addressee of their chosen situation.
- 3 Then, all students share their explanations with the class.
- 4 The whole class provides feedback.

Prick Up Your Ears









This activity enables students to talk about wishes and regrets. It also encourages students to improve their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills.

Materials and Preparation

Make sure you have Internet access in your class. Make copies and cut out the worksheet on page 216.

- 1 Divide the students into groups of four or five.
- 2 Tell them that they are going to listen to a dialog. Ask them to listen very carefully as they are going to answer the comprehension questions afterwards.
- 3 Have students listen to the dialog twice. If necessary, repeat the process three times.
- 4 Tell the groups that they are going to answer the comprehension questions.
- 5 The students who raise their hands first get the chance to answer.
- 6 Remind the students that each correct answer is two points.
- 7 The group with the highest score is the winner of the game.



FUNCTIONS F1 Talking about wishes and regrets F2 Apologizing F3 Giving explanations











This activity enables students to practise how to apologize in different situations. It also encourages them to improve their listening, speaking and reading skills.

Materials and Preparation

Copy and cut out the photocopiable material on pages 217-218.

- 1 Divide the class into two teams, A and B.
- 2 Cut up the situation cards and apology cards and shuffle them face down on the table.
- 3 Ask each student of both teams to come and pick up a card.
- 4 Remind the students that team A players are going to pick up situation cards and team B players are going to pick up apology cards.
- When the player from team A picks up a situation card, e.g., "You didn't hear someone", the players of team B must 5 find the matching apology card in five minutes and say "Pardon?"
- Each team gets 5 points for each correct match. The team with the highest score wins the game.


